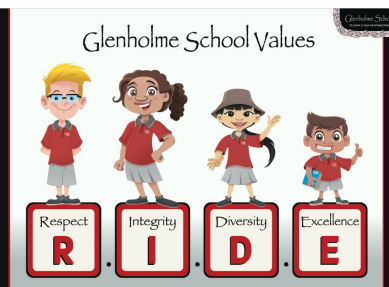
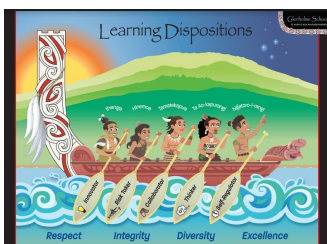

ENROLMENT SCHEME 2020

Enrolment at Glenholme School is governed by an enrolment scheme, details of which are available from the school office.

The board has determined that the following spaces are likely to be available for out-of-zone students next year.

Year 1 10

Year 2 10

Year 3 0

Year 4 0

Year 5 8

Year 6 0

The exact number of places will depend on the number of applications received from students who live within the school's home zone.

For students seeking enrolment within the first enrolment period, the deadline for receipt of applications for out-of-zone enrolments is 15th October.

Parents of students who live within the home zone and intend enrolling their child at any time during the next year should notify the school by 15th October 2019 to assist the school to plan appropriately for next year.

If the number of out of zone applications exceeds the number of places available, students will be selected by ballot on the 30th October.

During the year if a ballot is required it will be held during Week 8 each term.

Parents will be informed of the outcome of the ballot within three days of the ballot being held.

Glenholme School SCHOOL UNIFORM AND DRESS CODE

Compulsory School Uniform for all Year 0-6 students. The dress code has been designed to give students a wide choice of options whilst maintaining a school identity. Parent's select from the range of items available what is appropriate for their child / ren

- School Uniform Sun Hat for Yr 0-6 students in terms 1 and 4
- Shoes or sandals are to be plain black
- Socks are to be plain black
- Girls winter tights to be black
- Polypropylene or thermals (winter months) worn under the school uniform must be black

Notes:

- All new enrolments must start Glenholme School in full uniform.
- Students must wear regulation school uniform, non uniform items similar in colour and style are not acceptable.
- Except in an emergency, students must wear correct dress code. Parents must write a letter of explanation if their child wears non school uniform clothing or footwear, stating the reason. Your child presents the letter to school management in the morning.
- When a student comes to school with incorrect uniform and without a notice of explanation, parents are contacted and asked to collect their child, and take them home to dress them correctly and then return them to school.
- Any non uniform clothing items will be confiscated and must be collected by the student at the end of each day or by parents.
- The school accepts no responsibility for any non uniform clothing items which are confiscated.
- All school uniform items should be clearly named.
- The only jewellery items to be worn are medic alert ID, small stud earrings, a wrist watch or items of religious or cultural significance.

A reminder to all students that the only jewellery items to be worn at school are a medic alert ID, small stud earrings, a wrist watch or items of religious or cultural significance.

Water Only Policy



Rationale

We care about the health of our students

Sugary drinks⁽¹⁾ are one of the most significant causes of poor oral health and contribute greatly to childhood obesity and Type 2 diabetes.

We care about their achievement

Sugary drink consumption is associated with problem behaviours. Studies have found poor diet and nutrition are associated with lower academic achievement.

Our commitment

We will ensure parents and students receive clear, consistent messages about the importance of healthy choices and the impact of sugary drinks by:

- continuing to educate students about the importance of healthy drink choices and the benefits of consuming water
- actively promoting water as the best option in school publications
- ensuring staff commitment to model healthy drinking habits.

And we will create an enabling environment by:

- actively discouraging sugary drinks being brought to school by students
- providing water (and plain reduced fat milk) as the only drink option for students
- allowing students access to water during class time
- not associating our school with programmes that promote sugary drinks
- ensuring school lunch options don't include sugary drinks
- ensuring sports teams will only use water as their source of hydration
- not selling sugary drinks as part of sausage sizzles, the school gala or other celebrations.

(1) Any beverage that contains added caloric sweetener usually sugar. The main categories of sugary drinks include soft-drinks/fizzy-drinks, sachet mixes, fruit drinks, cordials, flavoured milks, flavoured waters, cold teas/coffee, and energy/sports drinks

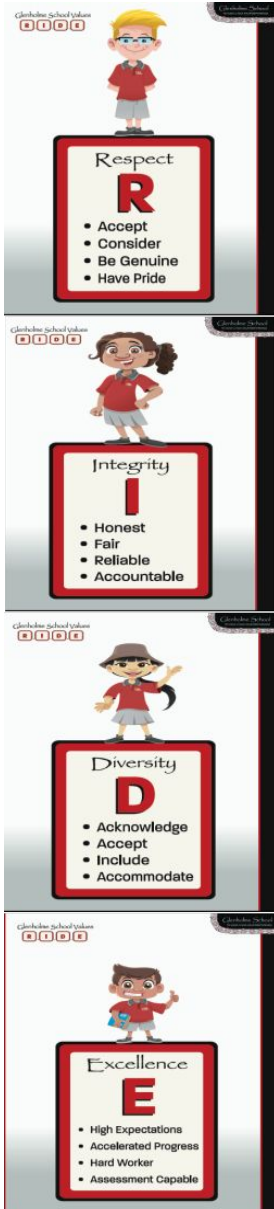
